Level 1: RED KEYS

Section 1: Rhythm

The time signature will be 2_4 , 3_4 , 4_4 or ${\bf C}$. (Remember that ${\bf C}$ means 'Common Time' and is the same as 4_4). You will need to look through the whole line first and then count one bar in before you clap the rhythm. Try clapping one or two of these at home each day, and after about a week you can give yourself a rating!

Level 2: DARK BLUE KEYS

Section 1: Rhythm

The time signatures are exactly the same as in Level 1 - but this time there are some RESTS and some TIES. It's very important to observe rests and ties when sight reading! Look through the whole line and count a bar in your head before you begin. Try a couple of these each day:

Level 3: GREEN KEYS



Section 2: Random Note Reading

You'll be tested on a range of one octave: from middle C to the next C in the treble clef.

The notes are written as semibreves, but you can just play them one after another in your own time. The idea is to get really good at playing random notes that are not in a pattern. You can also ask a parent or friend to point to any note in any music book for you to play; it's a great way to practise.

Here are some examples as they will look in the test. Try a different line each day, so that you don't memorise them... remember, it's supposed to be sight reading! Your teacher might also like to choose a line for you to play in your piano lesson.

Section 2: Random Note Reading

The range of notes in Level 6 extends to one leger line above or below treble or bass. Remember you're supposed to play them a little faster than previous levels, which is why the notes are minims! Choose a different line (or even half a line) to play each day.







Section 3: Melody Patterns

Recognising patterns in music makes piano sight reading really easy. In this level we'll learn about step, skip, and repeated note patterns.

If the notes move by step e.g. 'line-space-line' all the notes will be 'next door neighbours'. Just step from one finger to the next.



'space - space - space' the notes will NOT be 'next door neighbours'.

There will be a spare note in between, so you should skip a finger when you play.

If the notes stay on the same line or space, just play the same note on the keyboard!

When reading these patterns, look carefully at the FIRST NOTE and the PATTERN of each bar. Don't worry too much about the rhythm; the important thing is to recognise step/skip/ repeated note patterns. Choose a different line to play each day.

The fingering is given in the first two lines to help you out. Don't worry, you'll get used to it!

Section 3: Melody Patterns

In Level 4 the patterns will be a combination of steps, skips and repeated notes within each bar. You'll also notice there's a new rhythm in some bars: four crotchets in a row. Try to flow along as best you can! The important thing is to recognise the pattern. Don't worry too much about the fingering, you'll get used to it.

To make it easier, there are separate treble and bass examples (right hand for treble, left hand for bass). Try a different line (or even half a line) each day so that you don't memorise any of them... remember, it's sight reading!

Section 3: Melody Patterns

These patterns are similar to Level 4, but now they're on a grand stave. Before you play each line, look through to see the starting notes in each hand for each pattern, and decide on the best fingering. Remember: try to flow along as best you can!

Now we're going to learn how to sight-read chords in **root position** (that is, chords that look like a set of traffic lights!) quickly and easily. For root position chords, always use this fingering:

Right hand (1-3-5) $\frac{5}{8 \cdot 3}$ Left hand (5-3-1) $\frac{1}{2 \cdot 8 \cdot 3}$

The trick is: if you always use this fingering, you only need to read the BOTTOM note!

Try these chords with your right hand. Remember: read the bottom note only and put your thumb on it!



Now try these chords with your left hand. Remember: read the bottom note only and put your pinky (5th finger) on it!



Well done. Now you can try switching hands. Use right hand for treble clef chords and left hand for bass clef chords.

Remember: you only need to work out the BOTTOM NOTE of the chord!



So far we've learned to recognise chord 'I' shapes and chord ' V^{7} ' shapes. Now here's a new chord shape (called chord 'IV') in C major:



This new chord shape is 'taller' than the root position chord. G major and F major will feel very similar to C major. Practise these chords with your left hand:





Now that you are really good at reading and playing chords, it's time to recognise those chords when you see them broken up into a pattern. This is important because so many pieces have broken chord patterns, especially in the bass part.

Try the two patterns below. In each example there is a block chord followed by the same chord broken into a pattern.



Section 5: Sight-read a Piece

In each of these pieces there is a right hand melody and left hand block chords. For this level they are all in C major or A minor. Choose a different piece to try every time you practise, but do not memorise these pieces - they are for sight reading!

Before playing each piece, go through this checklist with your hands in your lap:

- ★ Look through the rhythm of the right hand. Are there any tricky bits?
- ★ Check the rhythm of the left hand. There may be some rests or ties.
- ★ Check the key signature and the last note, and watch for accidentals.
- ★ Does the melody move by steps or skips or both? Are there any leaps or intervals?
- ★ What is the LH chord sequence?
- ★ What is the starting position and the first note?

It might take you a minute or two to go through the checklist in your head. This is fine because in an exam you will usually be given this amount of time. If you get into a habit of thinking through these things, sight reading becomes much easier!

Section 5: Sight-read a Piece

You are now extremely good at sight reading and it's time to put all of your skills together. Not only do you have to read rhythm, melodic patterns and chord patterns all in a certain key, you also have to include DYNAMICS and ARTICULATION when playing hands together!

This is quite tricky, so to make it a bit easier in this level, each piece is notated twice. For example, 1b is exactly the same as 1a but with dynamics and articulation added.

Take your time to check all the usual things before you play the first version. Then have a quick check of the added details in the second version. Good luck!






